## Please Note Change to Usual Christian Muslim Dialogue Event



On Sun., April 29 the Christian Muslim Dialogue will meet from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. at Ohavay Zion Synagogue, 2048 Edgewater Court. This is a change from the usual Saturday meeting time and place.

The guest speaker will be Dr. Beth Goldstein, associate professor in educational policy studies and evaluation at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Goldstein's specialty is sociocultural foundations of international education. She has interests in issues related to gender, family literacy and educational border-crossing.

#### **Report From the General Assembly- Mar. 31**

This is our last full report on what is happening in the General Assembly, as most days from now on until dismissal will be veto or concurrence days.

On Thurs. night, Mar. 29, the Senate tacked a Committee Substitute to a sewage bill, SB 151, and turned it into a Pension Reform bill. (J. Carney). It was a 291 page bill which many legislators did not have time to read or digest. Teachers and other state workers felt that they were not allowed to be heard before votes were taken on the final version of the bill. The vote was 22 -15 in the Senate and 49-46 in the House. It now goes to the Governor.

Note: Teachers and other state workers continue to rally to direct attention to the budget which is yet to be signed.

Bills that passed one chamber or bills that passed both chambers:

**HB 227** - (J.Gooch, Jr. et al ) the solar net metering bill - This bill passed the House with Committee Substitute 49-45. Sent to Senate. (We oppose.)

**HB 185**- (D.Blanton et al) This bill increases the line-of-duty death benefits to wives and children. Passed the House with Committee Substitute and one floor amendment 89-0. Passed the Senate 37-0 with one floor amendment. (We support.)


**HB 363** - (R.Huff) This is a public assistance reform bill. It had passed the House and this week it passed the Senate 31-6. Sent to Governor. (We will monitor.)

**HB 1** - (D.Meade) This bill requires inclusion of abstinence education in any human sexuality or sexually transmitted disease curriculum. This bill passed the Senate 31 - 6. It was delivered to the Governor.

Nita and I would like to thank all of you who responded to our "Calls to Action" through the ten years that we were your legislative liaisons. We enjoyed working with the members of the LRC and our legislators as well as hosting our League Lobby Days.

PERSONAL HISTORY By Katharine Graham. Illustrated. 642 pp. New York: Alfred A. Knopf. \$29.95. On **Tues., April 17** the LWV Book Club will take up the inside story of the woman who ran the *Washington Post* during one of the most turbulent times in the history of American media. The book won the Pulitzer Prize for biography.

Journalist Nora Ephon wcaptured the essence of this work in one sentence: "Katharine Graham turns out to have had not two lives but four, and the story of her journey from daughter to wife to widow to woman parallels to a surprising degree the history of women in this century."
