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LWV Panelists Discuss Fake News



Braving the cold and snow of a wintery evening, a small but enthusiastic audience gathered Thursday, November 15 to question journalists on a topic that has become a buzz word, "fake news." Panel members in the photo are, left to right, Ryan Craig, Student Media Adviser in the Department of Communication and Information at the University of Kentucky and editor and owner of the *Todd County Standard*; Elizabeth Hansen, Professor Emerita, Department of Communications at Eastern Kentucky University; and Tom Eblen, Columnist and former Managing Editor for the Lexington *Herald Leader*.

Ryan Craig began the conversation differentiating three commonly seen examples of fake news: 1.) **propaganda** (we are familiar with wartime use by dictators); 2.) **rumors or speculation** planted in the media as fact to misinform the public; and 3.) **use of something negative but accurate** that portrays a public leader's point of view while not presenting other facts that give a more complete and balanced picture.

There was thoughtful engagement on the part of the audience. The journalists answered questions from even the youngest participants like an elementary school age youngster who asked the difficult question, "Why would people create fake news?"

The panelists shared handouts with the audience including one that ranked news agencies based on their level of truthfulness and their political leanings from most extreme right to most extreme left. Another listed numerous online fact-checking resources readily available to the public such as Politifact, FactCheck.org, the *Washington Post* Fact Checker and Snopes.com.

November Naturalization Ceremony the Last for This Year

On Friday, November 16, 43 applicants from 27 different countries took the oath of citizenship in the renovated U.S. District Court. Naturalization ceremonies are always special events but this one was even more memorable because fifth grade students from the Lexington Middle School sang several patriotic ballads during the ceremony. Their music included the *Star Spangled Banner* and *America the Beautiful*.

Welcoming the applicants for citizenship were Secretary of State Allison Lundergan Grimes, Jennifer Jackson from the Lexington LWV and representatives from several different chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution. Secretary Grimes reported a 47% turnout for the recent election, a better than average number but she emphasized to the soon-to-be new citizens that it was still less than half the number of registered voters eligible to vote. She encouraged her listeners to register to vote and exercise that right in all elections.

After the ceremony League volunteers were busy registering 11 new voters at the table and providing information for several others who wished to apply online. It should be noted that almost one third of the new citizens took advantage of the opportunity to register to vote. League volunteers included Frank and Susan Entwisle, Theresa McCarty, Nancy Barnett and Jennifer Jackson.



- 2. **HEALTH CARE REFORM:** Every U.S. resident should have access to affordable, quality health care, including birth control and the privacy to make reproductive choices.
- 3. **THE ENVIRONMENT:** As citizens of the world we must protect our planet from the physical, economic and public health effects of climate change while also providing pathways to economic prosperity.

We are proud to be nonpartisan, neither supporting nor opposing candidates or political parties at any level of government but always working on vital issues of concern to members and the public.
